It would be hard to dispute that Leonard Bernstein was one of the greatest American composers of the 20th century. But how much being Jewish mattered to Bernstein and how deeply it affected his music may surprise some people; even Gerard Schwarz, who studied, worked with and had a personal friendship with Bernstein had to do some research to realize the extent of the influence.

With works like his first surviving complete composition (a setting of *Psalm 148* as an art song for piano and voice written in his teens), choral and orchestral masterpieces such as the *Kaddish Symphony* and *Chichester Psalms*, and delightfully simple piano character pieces, this episode features world premiere recordings created by the Milken Archive, as well as historic works that are often overlooked in the Bernstein canon.
